

Palisades Hiking Trail

Moose

Keep a look out for the majestic Moose, the largest member of the deer family. The Palisades serve as a major moose travel corridor, providing ample aquatic feeding grounds for this monarch of the boreal forest.



Browse Lake

Relax and picnic on the shore of this picturesque lake atop the Palisades before heading back down.

Steep Climb

A series of constructed stairs and earthen trail will assist you in the steep climb up the palisade to heights over 130 metres (426 feet) above Orient Bay.

Entrance

Follow the blue and white TODS signs along Highway 11 to the trail entrance and parking area.

Peregrine Falcon

Stand at one of the numerous lookouts atop the cliffs and survey a spectacular panoramic view of the Pijitawabik Palisades. You may catch a glimpse of the endangered Peregrine Falcon perched on a cliff's edge.

Cascade Falls

Behold the thundering beauty of the 40 metre (132 feet) high Cascade Falls. Freezing up to 10 metres (33 feet) thick, this waterfall is one of the most popular ice climbing sites at Orient Bay. The ice wall offers a variety of climbing grades and ice variations.
